The San Diego City Council is taking up the proposed closure of Children's Pool on Tuesday, October 29th, 2 PM. On nearly the eve of that decision, the Sea Lions at the La Jolla Cove moved ashore in great numbers and took over the sandy beach area of the Cove. This is how it looked at the Cove with a large group of hauled out Sea Lions last Friday evening. Sea Lions have used the beach at the Cove for the past year but usually late at night.

With the City of San Diego seemingly willing to surrender our most cherished public beach at Children's Pool to the demands of animal rights extremists, can those same restrictions be far off for the La Jolla Cove? How long before we hear the demands to rope off or close the La Jolla Cove? As the Children's Pool moves closer to being closed, the La Jolla Cove is now in the sights of the extremists who see man as something foreign to nature and the natural environment. A check of Facebook for seal related pages shows the rallying cry has already been made to close or severely restrict public access at the Cove. Health Dept. warning signs for fecal contamination were posted on October 17th and quietly removed soon afterward.
